February 2018

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This is my first winter in Dunlop, and as someone who grew up near the Ayrshire coast where snowflakes fall but rarely lie, I've been really quite delighted by the snow of the past week. The snow has a truly transformative effect - in more than one way.

Snowfall makes our world sound different - quieter, more peaceful - providing something of a rest for our ears. Our wintry landscape becomes almost monochrome, with white fields and hills, gardens and roofs, contrasting with the dark trees, hedges and occasionally gritted roads! We see our familiar surroundings in a new way, and when the sun comes out we see a shining beauty which lifts the spirits and warms us despite the January chill.

A fresh blanket of snow is wonderful in its newness - a blank canvas as it were, upon which are soon written the marks of creation here in this place. The first marks are usually made by wild animals - rabbits, deer and foxes. My own pet cats have been reluctant to leave the house, so there aren't many feline paw prints in the manse garden! Later come the prints left by dog walkers and their faithful companions, followed the excitement of children with snowballs, snowmen and sledges!

Even before his birth, Jesus had the power to transform the world, and the changes wrought by the snow are a reminder of the possibilities of transformation. Not only in how we perceive the world, not only in the ways in which creation shows itself alive and active, but also in the ways we respond to each other. Over this past week people have shared information about how safe the roads are, looked in on elderly and unwell neighbours, cleared paths and pavements, pushed cars up hills, and put out water and bread for birds and other wildlife.

The snow brings a temporary transformation, and perhaps this changed-but-the-same landscape gives us a glimpse into the eternal and enduring transformation offered by, through and with Christ.

He is with us in snow, ice and thaw; sun, clouds and rainbows; always in compassion, hope and love.

Happy New Year to all our Dunlop Community Cinema supporters. We're back with a bang this month with 3 films for your delectation and many more to come over the next few months.

The first Film Club Film of the year will be 'Baby Driver'. Baby has been a getaway driver for kingpin Doc since he was too young to drive, always accelerating to the beat of his favourite tunes as they drown out his tinnitus from a childhood accident. When Baby meets waitress Deborah he sees a way out... It's an exhilarating piece of film making with a fantastic soundtrack and will be a great start to the new Film Club year. The opening sequence is worth the entrance fee alone. As ever, you don't have to be a member of the film club to come along. Join us on Friday 2nd February at 7.30pm. Next up on the 18th February at 3pm is our family film, 'Captain Underpants'. The film sees two friends unintentionally transform their school headmaster into their comic-book creation 'Captain Underpants' - a hapless, clueless superhero whose main power is extreme stupidity. It's a thoroughly entertaining and likeable film choc-full of the type of gags kids (and some adults) love. In other words, there's a LOT of toilet humour! It will have them rolling in the aisles. Friday 23rd February (7.30pm) brings the final film of the month - an epic war movie – Christopher Nolan's 'Dunkirk'. DUNLOP COMMUNUNITY HUB UPDATE

The Dunlop Community Hub was formed when Merito was put up for sale and we were forced to consider the prospect of a village without a pub. Considering the sizeable space available above the pub could also be put to good use by the community, the idea of a community take-over bid quickly gained pace and the Hub was formed to help facilitate the process. The plan is to try and gain funding from the Scottish Land Fund to buy the building and run it as a business which would also provide Dunlop with a flexible community space then distribute any profits made back into the village via our various community groups.

Following a packed (and informative) meeting in November where the initial plans were laid out and discussed, a larger committee has been formed to further prepare the Stage 2 funding application and discuss proposals for the currently vacant space above the pub. Anyone who is interested in taking part in the committee should get in touch with the Hub (details below) as involvement from the local community is key to the success of this project.

In order to prove to the funding body that they do have community support, the Hub have created a membership form to enable people to show their support for the venture. There is no money involved, you don't have to pay to be a member, but by signing up to the Hub you will help the group get one step closer to keeping this significant space open to the community. Forms can be collected from Merito or Normans and there will be a number of volunteers knocking on doors over the coming week or so delivering forms to anyone who is interested.

At the same time you will be asked your opinion on what the vacant space above the pub should be used for, and your views would be much appreciated. The Hub are well aware of the current facilities and opportunities offered by other community ventures and businesses and will ensure that any ideas that are taken forward do not interfere with anything that is currently in place. Working together as a community to bring the best ideas to the table will not only save our pub and open up more opportunities for Dunlop but also provide our village with more funds for the future so please come and get involved, we'd love to hear from you.
